Earth Day Events Beautify Kane County

Spring is a time of year when the blanket of winter is lifted and litter rears its ugly head. At the same time, the public can help beautify Kane County by taking part in community clean up events during several Earth Day celebrations.

On April 23 in Aurora, the office of State Rep. Barbara Hernandez is teaming up with the Fox Valley Park District for an Earth Day clean-up event at Gregory Island Park on Indian Trail Road. Also, on April 23 in honor of Earth Day, the Forest Preserve District of Kane County will be planting hundreds of trees at the Elburn Forest Preserve. The public is invited to help plant the trees in pre-dug holes with the District's Natural Resources staff from 9 a.m. – Noon or until they run out of trees. The public is encouraged to arrive at 9:00 a.m. and groups of 10 or more should contact the volunteer coordinator at 630-208-8662.

The annual Great Western Trail and Illinois Prairie Path all volunteer trails cleanup will take place in honor of Earth Day from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. on April 23 (rain/snow date is April 30). Volunteers should wear work gloves and bring their own garbage bags.

Friends of the Great Western Trails Voluntary Chairman Don Kirchenberg said the cleanup event this year takes on even greater significance than past events.

“We haven’t had an official cleanup in two years because of COVID. So, this is an incredibly important year,” Kirchenberg said.

“I will have a table at the event, and I’ll be collecting all dry-cell household batteries for recycling (2 lbs. limit per household please),” said Kane County Recycling Coordinator Clair Ryan.

Individual clean-up efforts start with a keen eye, a protective glove and a plastic shopping bag or two to hold the trash you find. A safety vest or brightly colored clothing is recommended if your route will take you along any busy roads. Litter can be disposed of through your curbside trash and/or recycling however, municipalities, park districts and forest preserves are also generally happy for their public receptacles to be used for litter.
